An estimated 350,000 people went on a treasure hunt, which former Vietnamese fighter pilot and art dealer Forrest Fenn claimed hid in the Rocky Mountains in 2010. However, they all returned empty-handed. In order to lend a helping hand to future treasure hunters, Fenn recently revealed an important clue in finding his fortune. After the Great Recession, he decided to hide the treasure about 1,000 miles between Santa Fe, New Mexico, and the Canadian border and announced the start of the hunt. A lot of people were losing their jobs, the desperation was in all the headlines, and I just wanted to give some people hope, he told ABC News. However, he had an ulterior motive for starting a nationwide treasure hunt - he wanted to encourage families to go on fun outdoor adventure trips. I wanted to give the kids something to do, he said. They spend too much time in the playroom or playing with their little portable text machines. I hope parents will take their kids camping and hiking in the Rocky Mountains. I hope they will fish, look for fossils, turn rotten logs to see what's underneath them, and look for my treasure. However, just because the search should be fun, it doesn't mean Fenn is going to make it an easy ride for aspiring treasure hunters. That's why he didn't divulge the secret location of his fortune even to his wife. If I die tomorrow, the knowledge of this place goes in a coffin with me. And seeing Fenn 86 years old, this day can come sooner rather than later. So, did anyone get close to finding out the location of the treasure? Unfortunately, according to Fenn, there is no way to know if a person has come in inches from his treasure if they actually find it. It will be found in the near future or in 1000 years, he said. Despite the fact that treasure hunters could not find the loot Over the past 18 years, people's obsession has only intensified. Online forums have been created where the treasures of enthusiast enthusiasts after theories about the likely location of values, what makes Fenn go on the record to debunk some of them . While the meaning of the poem is believed to guide someone towards hidden treasures, the book is said to hold subtle clues to help one with their search. Many treasure hunters, who actively pursue the name to gold, have also purchased Thrill Chase books from collected works. Below is a poem by Mr. Fenn, which encourages everyone to take part in the thrill of the chase! As I went alone Tami with my treasures bold, I can keep my secret where, And a hint of wealth new and old. Start it where the warm waters stop And take it down the canyon, not far, but too far to walk. Put in below Brown's house. From there it is no place for the meek, the end of ever drawing close; There will be no paddle your creek, just heavy loads and water high. If you were wise and found the flames, look quickly down, your quest to stop but belatedly skimpy with a miracle look, just take your chest and go into peace. So why should I go and leave my treasure for everyone to look for? The answers I already know I made is tired and now I'm weak. So listen to me all and listen well, your efforts will be worth the cold. If you are brave and in the woods I give you the title for gold. (Article 18, 2018 CNBC News) Fenn's Treasure is not in the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone River (January 2020 scrapbook #248) When people think of the Fenn treasure map, it usually comes to mind. This card is on the folding back page of Forrest Fenn's 265 book, *Too Far to Walk*. He came with the next note. The book is also full of other great memories, notes and ideas. Get your copy from the Bookstore Collected Works! A few years ago, I wrote a book called Thrill of the Chase. In it I talked about a chest full of gold and gems that I hid in the mountains. Dare to go out to all who have a sense of wandering; explore the clues in the book and thread the tract through the tricks of nature and circumstances to the treasure. If you can find it, you can have it. I warned that the path would not be straightforward for those who did not have confidence in the place beforehand, but sure for whoever did. We were recently included on the map and atlas of Benchmark Maps products, and had fun partnering with them to produce this treasure map. Their unique mapping styles speak to our common spirit of research. I declined their invitation to put X on the map, but admit that it's there in spirit. -Forrest Fenn This map of the Fenn treasure search area was produced by Benchmark Maps in Denver, CO in 2013 for Forrest Fenn's book, *Too Far To Walk*. Forrest said there was something unexpected on the map. Some people have suggested that this is the fact that the benchmark map of the Rocky Mountains ends on the Canadian-American border. The map is available in several sizes from Benchmark Maps with the same level of high detail: Sometimes Benchmark Maps produces limited editions of special treasure maps of Forrest Fenn. These maps take on a similar style to the original treasure map found in the *Too Far Walk Book* (see above). The map depicted here, 2016 Fennboree III. Fennboree is an annual festival held in honor of Forrest Fenn and in honor of the thrill of chasing and looking for Fenn's treasure. It is usually held at Hyde Memorial State Park in New Mexico. More information about Fennboree can be found on the Fennboree website. A poem about Forrest Fenn's treasures found on these maps the bottom left side is long with an image of a bronze treasure chest set behind the poem. Other subtle differences from the original map include coloring on the map, no notations showing the different types of land found on the map (public lands, BLM, OSFS, NPS, and Tribal) and longitude lines denoting related degrees. These special edition cards must be ordered or purchased while they are still available. In the past, they were made in batches of 100 serial runs and signed by Forrest Fenn. The original price for these Fennboree cards seems to be around \$100 USD. If you haven't been able to buy a card on the original offer, the only way to get one is from someone who currently has one. Adventurers, explorers and other treasure hunters, others have made some useful and interesting maps related to the treasure of Forrest Fenn over the years. You can find links to some of the best maps and download them in high resolution here! Ross Thorn is a cartographer who likes to play with instruments and the framework of the Geographic Information System (GIS). He became interested in Forrest Fenn's treasures back in 2016 and decided to create a treasure hunt for Forrest Fenn based on data to demonstrate the area where the treasure chest might be. The map is currently on Ross's github page. Ross began with Forrest Fenn's claims that the treasure is located between altitudes 5,000 to 10,200 feet above sea level, the fact that the treasure is next to a small pine and sage brush, and the fact that the treasure is sometimes wet due to physics (even in the warmer months), placing it next to a body of water potentially. All of these facts were stated by Forrest. The result was this map. The map highlights several areas, including areas where the treasure chest is probably to be found (green zone), can be found in (yellow area), and impossible to find in (white area). The map also notes features such as cities, peaks, streams, reservoirs, interstate highways, national and state parks. Using these areas, we see that there is still a lot of land to cover in search of the treasures of Forrest Fenn. However, this will help narrow down the field when checking potential solutions locations and it's great to see the data behind Forrest Fenn's tips on the map! Data sources: Map and site data come from the Albers Equal Area Global Conic Projection with information on land cover from the U.S. Geological Survey, altitude data from Viewfinder Panoramas, hydrology and baseline data from the National Atlas, Peaks and Cities of Natural Earth Information, and ESRI Park Information. Forrest Fenn's treasure map was created by Toby Pennington for Reader's Digest. It was published in their April-May 2018 edition. Forrest Fenn said the treasure was above 5,000 feet above sea level, below 10,200 feet, and near pine and brush (he could smell it). Using this information, Toby highlights all probable, possible and impossible places where the treasure chest can be hidden. He also noted other key features of the map, such as cities, water sources, and national and state parks and places. Read the full Reader's Digest article. This map is useful in narrowing down possible solutions locations as there are some areas that don't fit the places close to what Forrest said. How did you ever wonder how far Forrest Fenn could have wisely traveled to the Rockies? This question seems to be crucial to finding Fenn's treasures as it can narrow down the treasure search area. Unfortunately, Forrest's response could have traveled almost anywhere in the Rockies to hide gold and treasure chest. Forrest had access to many resources, including the Piper Malibu Mirage. He talks about this plane and where he liked to fly in a note Forrest Fenn thirteen. This helps us understand how far Forrest Fenn could travel within the Rocky Mountains. Although Forrest Fenn probably flew and had access to several planes, he mentioned how much he enjoyed flying his Piper Malibu Mirage M350. This aircraft is capable of flying in mountainous conditions, according to the rules of flight instruments (IFR) and visual flight rules (VFR), and can be manned almost anywhere in the Rocky Mountains. It has: 350 hp Turbocharged Lycoming TIO-540-AE2A Piston Engine 120 U.S. Gal (454 litres) fuel tank 1,343 nautical miles (nm) range (1 nautical mile and 1,151 Miles) 25,000 feet of maximum height Seating up to 5 passengers in the cockpit class of the aircraft (meaning the cockpit and cockpit are one attached unit) Under the pressure of the cockpit retractable chassis Piper Malibu Mirage M350 is able to fly the entire spectrum of the Rocky Mountains inside the United States as well as parts of Canada. For example, the distance from Santa Fe Municipal Airport (KSAF) from Forrest's home to Sweet Grasse, Montana, on the U.S.-Canada border is about 841.85 nm. The maximum range of the Piper Malibu Mirage extends as far north as Edmonton, Alberta, Canada at about 1117.29 nm (depending on weather and flight conditions). As far as we know, fenn's treasure hunt ends at the Canadian border. We also have to take into account that wherever Forrest landed (if he flew to hide the treasure chest) there was a local, regional or municipal airport or runway in the immediate vicinity. He said he drove the sedan treasure hidden place, and did not want to say when to avoid people looking at rental car records for that particular term. Also, keep in the mine some small airports courtesy of vehicles visiting pilots can rent or check during the day for local trips. In a note of thirteen, Forrest Fenn noted that one of his great pleasures was ... going to the airport pushing the door open, cranking that beautiful sounding 350 HP Lycoming engine, and heading northwards or Wyoming without knowing or caring where I would land. It seems that Forrest often visited the states of New Mexico, Wyoming and Montana (as well as New Mexico and Colorado, as he had to fly through them, heading north). He also probably flew to Yellowstone Regional Airport (COD) in Cody, Wyoming and surrounding areas during his time at the Buffalo Bill Center Western Museum Board of Directions and as a museum trustee. This makes it difficult to narrow down the search area specifically due to the fact Forrest Fenn owned a capable aircraft and probably flew it to hide his treasure chest.
